How should Western Sydney embrace renewable and resilient energy to help achieve net zero emissions by 2050?

Western Sydney University and Common Purpose, the global leadership development not-for-profit, are aligned in their commitment to ensuring students have the skills and capabilities to thrive.

Following on the success of our first program together in 2019, we are now scaling up our partnership to run the inaugural City Challenge program in Western Sydney. It will be run in partnership with the 21C Curriculum Project and The Academy, and with the Greater Sydney Commission. We are delighted that Liz Dibbs, the Western City District Commissioner will be supporting the program again.

The program is designed to develop students' ability to thrive in complex situations, lead diverse groups and create innovative solutions.

Who is it for?

The City Challenge will bring together a diverse, interdisciplinary group of up to 500 students from all levels of study and across all campuses.

The City Challenge 27–28 February 2020 and will be held on Parramatta South Campus.

Students will get the chance to:

Work in a new and ambiguous environment to tackle a pressing city challenge.

Deliver real impact in the city in which they are studying.

What's the learning journey?

Students on the program have been set a pressing challenge by the Greater Sydney Commission:

“How should Western Sydney embrace renewable and resilient energy to help achieve net zero emissions by 2050?”

Students get a high level briefing from the city's leadership, go deeper into the critical areas of the challenge with experts in the field, and go out to visit organisations on the frontline to meet the people affected by the challenge. Working with advisors from the University's staff, the students will develop an idea in response to the challenge which is judged by their peers and by experts, before five groups present their ideas to a panel comprising the Greater Sydney Commission as well as industry and University leaders.

A final winning idea will be selected by the panel, which will receive support from the Commission and the University to turn the idea into reality.
